

The Declaration of Independence



- It was dated July 4, 1776, but was really signed on July 2, 1776
- The Declaration of Independence was written to declare their Independence from Britain
- 56 people signed the Declaration of Independence
- It was signed in the Pennsylvania State House in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

The Constitution

- The Constitution was signed on September 17, 1787
- The Constitution was written to establish fundamental laws for the United States of America
- The U.S. Constitution was written in secret, in a locked room that was guarded by sentries
- It was written and signed in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania



The Bill of Rights



- The Bill of Rights became effective on December 15, 1791
- The Bill of Rights was added to the Constitution because they felt it was necessary to safeguard individual liberty
- There are 10 amendments in the Bill of Rights
- They were drafted in New York City

- The speaker can be any ordinary citizen
- There are no legal restrictions on who can be the speaker
- The House of Representatives chooses who is the Speaker of the House

Secretary of State



The duties of the Secretary of State include:

- Advise the president on foreign matters
- Help negotiate treaties
- Communicates issues relating the United States foreign policy to Congress and the U.S. citizens
- Promote positive encounters between the U.S. and other countries

Current Secretary of State is Mike Pompeo

Supreme Court



The duties of the Supreme Court include:

- To interpret the U.S. Constitution
- Have Judicial Review
- To interpret laws to ensure they are constitutional
- To ensure laws are faithfully applied
- To rule on cases involving the Constitution, federal laws, treaties, and disputes between states
- There are nine justices that sit on Supreme Court

Senate

Duties of Senate include:

- Serve 6 terms
- Write and pass laws
- Approve Presidential Appointments
- Ratify treaties with other countries
- Every state has two senators

Duties of the House of Representatives Include:

- Serve two-year terms for their specific congressional district
- Introduce bills and resolutions
- Offer Amendments
