The name of the app we evaluated was CardFlow. Version 3.8 by Qrayon app developer. The developer didn't really state a specific age group, but we thought this would be appropriate for children to use once they begin to read and write. Since you can customize the note cards, you could even use them to have children practice their letters. This app fits under the Tools and Drill and Practice types. It is a great tool because it keeps all of your flash cards in one organized area, but it would also be great for a Drill and Practice self-evaluation. This could fit into any number of curriculums, from science and history flashcards to learning letters and working on site words. CardFlow would work as a teacher tool or in a single user, small group, lab setting, and mobile environments. Very versatile in it's usage. The Lite version was free, but there was a paid version for \$9.99.

CardFlow is a Index and Flashcard app that allows you to create, customize, and organize any number of cards. It allows for quick practice, or simple speech assistance. You can also create a storyboard that uses the cards and allows you to draw whatever you need. This is a great app for students, teachers, or anyone who needs a little organization in their life. This would be a good way to organize a classroom or office.

Overall, Kayla, Michaela, and Carinna liked this app. We would use it to help our students organize their thoughts and create cards for the things they couldn't remember. It might not be immediately attractive to younger students but once you get into the cards you can pick different colors and draw on them. This would be a helpful app for both teachers and students to use in the classroom.
