Description of the Software	There are four options at the bottom of the homepage - home which is where all the scans you have taken will be, search which brings up many shopping options, a camera so you can scan the QR's, and a picture of a QR. That last one is where you can create your own QR and for the free version you can just change the background color while the pro allows for you to completely customize the look of your QR. This app offers several types of QR's that you can create ranging from text, contact, email address or phone number all the way to social media profiles, youtube, and medical ID's.
Impression of the Software	I think that this app would be good for just basic QR scans which aren't that popular anymore but I do think they would be cool to offer in the classroom for the students. I do think that this app would also be good to create QR's but the free version doesn't offer very many options like the pro. The search bar bringing up different shopping websites I thought was weird, I'm not sure if I missed something but I found it odd to be included with this app.
