Software

The Splice app is a tool because it allows students to make movies for whatsoever they desire. We love how it sparks creativity in them as well as teachers. The app has a plus sign that allows users to add not only previously taken videos but photos as well. The song choices are great and diverse. Some of the effects include a list of transition that allows the user to choose how it would like to go from one photo/video to another. An example of a type of transition is a "crossfade." With this type of transition, the old photo/video fades and the new one appears across the screen from both the left and the right. Other things that the app allows is for users to add filters, voice recordings, text, and to customize their intros and outros.



Impressions

We loved how this app was free, but also still very useful. It gives the user a lot of options compared to other apps such as Flipagram. It responded appropriately and had some wonderful features.
